Our Faculty

Prof. Vegna's scholarly interests focus on language pedagogy and second language acquisition, as well as Italian cinema, particularly cinematic portrayals of women in relation to the mafia. Her book Donne, mafia e cinema: una prospettiva interdisciplinare (2017) offers a critical analysis of gender roles in depictions of the Sicilian mafia in contemporary Italian film. Her interest in this topic arises from both her academic research and her experience as a journalist in Palermo. the Italian city where she was born and raised. Her most recent articles, along with her course "Women in Italian Organized Crime Through Cinema" (ITAL 22440), extend this inquiry to include various Italian mafias and the roles women play within these organizations. Conversation and collaborative learning are central to all her courses. She strives to create a friendly and welcoming environment in which students reflect collectively on diverse cultural and social contexts through the course content, while also actively shaping the class itself. In addition to ITAL 22440, this winter she will teach "Migration, Identity, and Belonging in Italian and Spanish Cinema" (ITAL 23880) together with Prof. Mario Santana.

Take Italian! You will develop the knowledge and critical skills necessary to understand and engage with a variety of aspects of Italian culture and society. Our classes are small, so you will receive privileged attention from instructors, enhancing the quality of your learning. After two years of Italian, you can go study at the oldest university in Western World, Bologna!

Thanks to a FLAG grant, I was able to study Italian in Florence and take the Civilization Core in Rome. Beyond strengthening my language skills, the extended stay allowed me to travel on weekends to nearly twenty museum collections featuring export East Asian art across Europe. These encounters shaped my early interests in exotica, global art history, and thing theory, ultimately leading me to further pursue a PhD in art history at UChicago.

I recall stepping into the darkness of the Sibyl's cave in Naples, stumbling upon a seaside castle in Trieste filled with Chinese porcelains, and pausing before a faded, anonymous rose beneath the tombs of saints in Rome. Beyond its practical value, Italian is woven into some of the most formative memories of my undergraduate years.

Italian continues to be an essential tool in my research on export art and Qing court art, enabling me to access archival materials such as missionary letters and travel diaries, while also laying a strong foundation for acquiring other Romance languages like French.
